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Words from the President: What Future Direction for Grade Four Band Competitions?

Please Plan to Attend the AGM!

I hope many of you are planning on attending the AGM this year in Phoenix. We have many issues to discuss, and we need your voice and opinions.

One of the big issues we will be discussing is where we want to take grade 4 bands in the future. Let me give a little bit of background on where grade four was and where it is currently. One thing that hasn't changed in grade 4 is the medley, and we aren't looking at changing the medley at this time.

What we are looking at is the Mini-MSR and the direction we want our grade 4 bands to take.

History of Grade 4 Requirements

Years ago, grade 4 bands played a medley and full MSR, and it had been that way for many years.

So when we changed to the QMM (Quick March Medley) to follow what was happening in Scotland, many bands were unhappy with the change. But as we moved forward the QMM became accepted and fairly popular with our grade 4 bands.

Then Scotland and most of the other associations in North America changed back to a Mini-MSR and then into a full MSR. Slowly the WUSPBA changed to a Mini-MSR, but that didn't match what was being played outside of WUSPBA. One association, the PPBSO from Ontario, bucked what others associations were doing and went back to the QMM for their grade 4 bands.

Three Possibilities to Be Decided

So at the 2017 AGM, we will be voting on three possibilities for grade 4 bands. One is to follow the PPBSO and go back to playing the QMM in grade 4 -- we could leave the Mini-MSR the way it is now -- or we could move back to a full MSR.

Pros and Cons

Let's take a look at the pros and cons to each of these recommendations and give you some factors to think about. Moving back to the QMM -- Many feel that moving back to the QMM would be in the best interest for the development of grade 4 bands in our association. They feel it is too big a jump to go from grade 5 into grade 4 because bands have to learn both a medley and an MSR. Bands playing at the lower end of grade 4 really can't play an MSR properly, so it isn't enhancing their progress. This would mean that bands in our association couldn't play outside our association unless they went to Ontario or they learned an MSR.

Some will also argue that by moving back to the QMM, we are taking a step back, and with the growth and development of piping recently we should keep moving forward.

So the question you need to be asking yourself is should grade 4 be a beginning or introductory playing level, or is that for grade 5? If it isn't for introductory bands, should it ask much more, or are we asking too much? What do we want out of our grade 4 bands?

Stay the same –The second option is to leave things just the way they are currently. We are only two years into the Mini-MSR competition. The only real complaints I have received have come from judges who feel the strathspey and reel are completed so quickly that they have a hard time getting a sense of a band's true ability.

Go to a full MSR -- The last possibility is to have a full MSR (4 parts march, strathspey, and reel), which could be made up of two-parted tunes. This would require bands to add two more parts of strathspey and reel to what they are currently playing.

The pros of this are that WUSPBA bands could compete outside our association, and bands would be required to step it up a little more. The cons would be that if bands can't play a strathspey or reel properly now, will adding two more parts help them to play four parts better?

Here is what you should be thinking about with this proposal. If this goes into effect, will it cause many grade 4 bands on the lower end of the grade to eventually be moved down to grade 5? Will grade 5 bands be able to make this jump? Should we be asking more or less out of our bands, and what is reasonable?

Observations of Other Associations

I had the opportunity this summer to play outside our association and here is what I saw: the grade 3 bands in that association would all be playing in grade 2 here in WUSPBA. This was causing a log jam in their grade 4, because who would want to move up and play against virtually grade 2 bands in grade 3?

I can see why in that association they need grade 4 to play a full MSR, and that is because the top of their grade 4 should be in grade 3 in my opinion.

Now I am not trying to speak for this other association. They need to place bands in the grade they feel comfortable with, but I feel part of the reason many associations have different requirements for bands stem from the grading process.

What makes a grade 5, grade 4, or grade 3 band? What should we require bands to play? How are we as an association trying to

develop bands and improve their performances?

We Need Your Input

I don't have the answer to all these questions, which is why we need you at the AGM. Think over what you feel grade 4 bands should play for their level. Bring those ideas to the AGM, and we can have a good discussion to help us lead our association forward.

We need to do what is best for us, and if it follows the other associations, then great. If we go down a different path, I am fine with that too.

Thank you all for your help these last two years!

In Praise of Smaller Games

Competitive pipe bands are interested in venues that may offer them the most opportunity for advancement within WUSPBA (or other respective organizations).

Realistically, that advancement may cause these competitive groups to overlook the smaller games or festivals in favor of the larger ones.

Smaller games or festivals offer competition for many competitive groups (including athletics and dancing) and for piping and drumming, solo competitions as well. Although the competitive fields can be smaller than larger games, it can offer an opportunity to practice competing for the next larger games and at the same time, offer real results and feedback.

Incentives Beyond Financial

Budget plays a role when selecting the venues that the pipe band will attend, and smaller games often times have less financial incentives. But some games may have other incentives that may offset some costs to competitive groups, such as established tent space, food or discounts towards meals, and lower hotel costs. Smaller games have all the groups that make a games or festival fun and informative.

Clan tents, food and other vendors, athletics and may include a children's area, as well as excellent entertainment.

Many of these groups interact with others to provide a spectacle for attendees; piping in the dogs of the British Isles, the athletes and clans, as well as massed bands.

In order to provide the travel time back to home for many bands, some games (Albuquerque, NM, Flagstaff, AZ) hold massed ceremonies at noon, so that groups can leave after competition.

Beer Tent!

Smaller games also provide the means to interact with other bands in a convivial environment. Albuquerque and Flagstaff, for example, provide a beer tent close to the competition areas to allow more interaction with groups; Albuquerque provides common tent space.

Smaller games such as Albuquerque, place an emphasis on performance-only pipe bands, showcasing the bands in front of the main stage so that attendees, who may not be interested in competition, can enjoy the sound of pipes and drums.

Fun and Entertainment

Playing the instruments that we are passionate about should be about fun and entertainment – not just to an audience, but to the all of the vendors and other competitors, as well as each other.

Archie McNeill, the "Blind Piper"

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One of the best known books used when learning to play the bagpipes is *The College of Piping Tutor 1*.

This book was written by Seumas McNeill and Thomas Pearston. Both men learned to play the bagpipes from Archie McNeill,

known as "the Blind Piper."

His teaching methods became the basis of the tutor.

Who was Archie McNeill and why was he called the blind piper?

Archie McNeill was born February 23, 1879 in Glasgow. When he was young his family moved to the village of Rhu. It was here, where at the age of 10, he had an accident that slowly caused him to lose his sight.

He started learning to play the bagpipes when he was about 15. A piper, Roderick Fraser, worked on the same yacht and agreed to teach him if he bought a practice chanter.

A few years later he started taking instruction with John Wallace, composer of "Liberton Pipe Band." Wallace was a teacher on the training ship C.T.S. Empress. He started a juvenile band composed of boys from the ship. Archie took lessons from him for a few years, until Wallace left the C.T.S. Empress for other employment.

By the time he was in his late teens he had completely lost his sight. He moved to Glasgow where he worked at the Blind Asylum making brushes. It was here that he became part of the Glasgow piping scene, where many local pipers would meet at a local pub on Friday nights.

Archie soon started giving piping lessons. Although he could not see, he was said to have perfect hearing. He was also a strict instructor. He would at times place his fingers over his students to feel how far they were lifting off the chanter. He was also able to hear minute crossing noises that others did not.

In 1917 Archie became the pipe major for the 139th Glasgow Boy's Brigade Pipe Band.

His students in this band included his sons, Donald and Alex, as well as his nephew, Seumas MacNeill, Thomas Pearston, and Wee Donald MacLean. The Glasgow Boy's Brigade won the World Juvenile Championships in 1919, 1920, and 1923.

Archie continued to teach there for 17 years.

Archie worked at the Henderson Bagpipe Workshop after WWII testing the quality of the chanters and drones.

He was a committed member of the Scottish Pipers & Dancers Association, a precursor to the Scottish Pipers Association, of which he was also a member.

After the College of Piping was formed in 1944, by Thomas Pearston and Seaumus McNeill, Archie became an instructor there, and would also teach at the Summer School sessions. He also wrote articles for the *Piping Times* and acted as a judge at piping competitors.

Archie McNeill died on October 23, 1962. In addition to being the "grandfather" of the College of Piping, he is also known for his compositions.

His most famous tune is "Donald MacLean's Farewell to Oban." He also wrote the great strathspey "Islay Ball." His other compositions include "the Detroit Highlanders," "David Ross of Rosehill," "Verna Leith's Wedding March," and the "Gairloch."

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
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Transportation
