

BRIGHDE CHAIMBEUL

Chaimbeul was born in 1998 and brought up in <u>Sleat</u> on the <u>Isle of Skye</u>, and is a native <u>Gaelic speaker</u>.

She learned the fiddle and piano before taking up the pipes at the age of seven, having been inspired to learn the pipes after hearing Rona Lightfoot at the age of four. She received tuition from Niall Stewart, and competed successfully in solo competitions on the Great Highland bagpipe from a young age.

Along with her four siblings, she attended <u>St Mary's Music School</u> in <u>Edinburgh</u>, where she received tuition from Jain Speirs.

In 2014, Chaimbeul took up the <u>Scottish smallpipes</u> being gifted a set of pipes by <u>Hamish Moore</u>, and received tuition on the smallpipes from his son Fin Moore. A bursary from the <u>Saltire</u> <u>Society</u> allowed her to visit Bulgaria to study the piping tradition there, and her music has been influenced by Bulgarian, Irish, Scandinavian and Cape Breton traditions. Chaimbeul has worked extensively with <u>Aidan O'Rourke</u>, as well as <u>Ross Ainslie</u>, John McSherry, Paul Meehan, <u>Martin Green</u>, <u>Carlos Núñez</u> and <u>Allan MacDonald</u>.

Chaimbeul won the <u>BBC Radio 2 Young Folk Award</u> in 2016, and the "Horizon Award" in the 2019 <u>BBC Radio 2 Folk Awards</u>. Her debut album *The Reeling* was recorded in 2019 in the <u>Cromarty East Church</u>, featuring Aidan O'Rourke, Radie Peat from <u>Lankum</u>, and <u>Rona Lightfoot</u>. She has played at events including <u>Celtic Colours</u>, <u>Celtic Connections</u>, and <u>Piping Live</u>.

Her older sisters Màiri and Steaphanaidh are <u>harpists</u>, her father <u>Aonghas Phàdraig Caimbeul</u> is a writer and broadcaster, and her mother Liondsaidh Chaimbeul is a sculptor.
